JAPANESE HISTORY



- Creation Story
- Shinto
- Role of the Emperor Dynasty established in 600
 BCE







MEIJI RESTORATION

- End Shogunate
- Bring the Emperor back to REAL power
- Westernization, Industrialization
- Only Asian country that escaped European imperial expansion
- Desire to compete with European powers



RUSSO-JAPANESE WAR: 1904 - 1905

- Imperial rivalries between Russia and Japan
- Manchuria and Korea
- First time in modern history an Asian power defeated a European power



WWI



- Japan secured sea lanes in the Pacific for the Allies
- Opportunity to extend their power in China
- Japan's representative at the Conference of Versailles in 1919



MUKDEN INCIDENT - INVASION INTO MANCHURIA

- Japan wanted to expand their control of Manchuria
- Japanese Railway in Manchuria near Mukden
- Japanese set off an explosion (didn't destroy anything - a train used the railroad minutes later)
- Blamed China for not protecting Japanese assets
- Pretext for an invasion into China

INVASION INTO CHINA - RAPE OF NANJING

- 6 week period beginning in December, 1937
- Mass murder, mass rape
- 250,000-300,000 killed (estimate)
- Japanese nationalists still claim it didn't happen, or has been exaggerated

 Japanese records were deliberately destroyed at the end of WWII



JAPAN VS. THE UNITED STATES

- Economic Sanctions after Japanese invasion of China in 1937
- embargo on exports of scrap metal, oil, and aviation fuel to Japan
- U.S. froze Japanese bank accounts in America
- U.S. loaned money to China to help them fight the Japanese
